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# CORRESPONDENCE.

To: The Editor, Nigerian Ornithologists' Society.

Doar Sir,

I am grateful to Professor Skinner for explaining to us the movements of the Grey-headed Kingfisher <u>Haleyon leucocephala</u> within Nigeria (Bull.Niger. Orn.Soc. 5(20):88-90).

To summarise his findings this bird is found:-

- a. Nov.- Feb: between latitude 4.50 7.50N.; non-breeding.
- b. (late Jan.) Feb.- May (early June) between latitude 7.5° 11.2°N.; breeding. (mainly Mar.- May for Plateau at lat. approx 9.7°N.).
- c. Juno-Sept. between latitude 120-150N. non-breeding.
- d. Oct .- Nov. : a rapid southerly migration back to a.

Most of my own records of this bird would fit in with this migratory pattern, except for the following, on which I would be grateful for Professor Skinner's observations:-

- 1. At Yankari, on 5th and 6th March 1966, I did not see any Grey-headed Kingfishers, the common kingfisher being the Blue-breasted H. malimbicus. But from 31st Jan.—2nd Feb. 1969, the Grey-headed was the common kingfisher, and only one Blue-breasted was seen. Were these Jan./Feb. Grey-headed Kingfishers early migrants north, or late migrants south, or do some stay over in the reserve from October to June? Why did I fail to see them in March 1966 when they should have been becoming plentiful?
- 2. On the Plateau, my earliest record is 10th February (earlier than Smith's) and the latest is 14th May, except for one seen at Makafo (9.5°N.) on 24th June, 1967 presumably a very late-migrating bird, rather than indicative of some which do not migrate north?

For the southerly migration, I have several field cards with no records of Grey-headed Kingfishers, suggesting that they do not reach this latitude until November. I have a record for the last week in December 1965, again at Makafarather later than expected, though not as late as Fry's late December record from Yankari.
