New records for Malam'fatori, Lake Chad. The following new records for this area were made in July 1965:

Gallinula angulata Lesser Moorhen - about 10 amongst rank vegetation around the edge of a small pond on 5th July; one there on 10th.

<u>Pinarocorys erythropygia</u> Rufous-rumped Bush-Lark - one on 9th July. (In addition a small lark species was much in evidence; specimens were collected and British Museum identification is awaited.)

Pseudohirundo griscopyga Grey-rumped Swallow - at least a thousand, and perhaps several thousand, distributed over a large area on 6th July.

Riparia paludicola Sudan Sand-Martin - a sand-martin over the lake on 9th July was considered to be this species.

Lanius excubitorius Grey-backed Fiscal Shrike - (see preceding page).
