### AFRICAN MIGRANT BIRDS IN NIGERIA

An Appeal for Information and Co-operative Study

Despite the impracticability of holding conventional meetings, our Society has exhibited every sign of flourishing since its inception 2½ years ago. Membership has increased steadily, finances are healthy, and the BULLETIN has appeared regularly. Recently it has been felt that the time is ripe for some co-operative investigation by members, \*\* and the study of African bird migration in Nigeria is a worthy and ideal subject.

In an article in the accompanying issue of the BULLETIN, J.H.Elgood has outlined the major problems to be resolved, and has given a familyby-family list to show the species which are thought to be migratory. If all members of the Society could assist in this national project by gathering further information within the next year, some real progress will be made, and Elgood's article is by way of appeal for such help. Regrettably, this appeal appears two or three weeks later than anticipated, at a time when much migration of African birds has just occurred, out systematic study over the forthcoming 12-month period could produce a great deal of invaluable information. The list of birds in the article is very probably incomplete, so that you, as a member living more or less continuously in, or retired from, a specific area of Nigeria, have reason to believe that such-and-such a bird is migratory, we would be very grateful if omissions were brought to our attention. What we want is dates, dates at specific areas of observation. If enough raw data can be collected in this way, spread over most of Nigeria, some pattern of novement may well emerge for species that have so far seemed no more than sporadic. We also need to know whether breeding of the species in question occurs in your area, if this can be ascertained.

Ideally, information on migration should be obtained by systematic watching at a locality. First and last dates should be recorded, and the duration, direction and volume ofpassage when apparent. Seasonal fluctuation in numbers of a species which is present throughout the year is important, since such a species might well in fact be migrant. Members who would be kind enough to undertake studies of migrants will find the Society's Field Cards a convenient way of recording and sending in their data. What is needed, then, is recording of birds at a locality as regularly and systematically as possible, and members who feel that they could participate in this work are invited to get in touch with any of the undersigned to give any data that they may already have, or to seek additional information or advice.
